SUBSTANTIVE CALL DATA

From January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016, a total of **7,075 substantive calls** were made to the National Human Trafficking Hotline by males in the United States. Substantive calls exclude hang-ups, wrong numbers, declined calls, missed calls, and calls in which the hotline could not determine the caller's reason for calling. The following information is based on these 7,075 calls.

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HUMAN TRAFFICKING CASE DATA

From January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016, the National Human Trafficking Hotline received information regarding 7,623 potential cases of human trafficking in the United States. A case corresponds to an incident of human trafficking. Each case may contain multiple calls about a single incident of human trafficking and can include multiple potential victims of trafficking. Some of the statistics below are non-cumulative because individual cases can include multiple potential victims with varying demographics. Additionally, in some cases, demographic information may not have been reported to the National Hotline. The following information is based only on the 973 (12.76%) of these cases which involved at least one male.

³ Online Ad, Venue Unknown cases typically involve reports of sex trafficking in which an individual is advertised for commercial sex online but the venue of the sex act is unknown or not specified.

⁵Cases where trafficking type is not specified typically occur when a law enforcement agent or service provider contacts the National Hotline for resources and referrals but does not disclose details about the trafficking situation due to confidentiality. This category also includes cases in which the person reporting the information references human trafficking but does not provide further detail regarding the presence of labor or commercial sex. These cases are often submitted to the National Hotline through anonymous online tip reports.



Areas in which greater numbers of cases were reported contain more red shading. This map only reflects cases in which the location of the potential trafficking was known. Some cases may involve more than one location.

Important Notes:

The data displayed in this report was generated based on information communicated to the National Human Trafficking Hotline via phone, email, and online tip report. Each situation of trafficking reported to the National Hotline was assessed for indicators of human trafficking and was found to have at least moderate- or high-level indicators. Assessment are made based on the information reported to the hotline. The National Human Trafficking Hotline is not able to verify the accuracy of reported information.

This is not a comprehensive report on the scale or scope of human trafficking in American Indian Communities in the United States. It represents only calls and cases made to the National Hotline from January 1, 2016 to December 31, 2016.

These statistics are accurate as of June 8, 2017. They may be subject to change as new information emerges.
